

Original Bearing Trees:

Cedar - 14" - N75°W - 10 links (6.60')

Cedar - 14" - S45°E - 17 links (11.22')

I positioned the corner at a proportionate location from which to search. The corner falls in a very thick cedar swamp. I could find no evidence of the original bearing trees and could not make the natural feature ties from the original notes coincide with a satisfactory location from the math point.

I monumented the proportionate location after a thorough search of the area could reveal no original evidence. Our position falls on the edge of an old trail running S5°E.






