
INSTRUCTIONS:

Quarter corner common to Sections 5 and 6, T36N, R16E.




(b) Describe any record evidence, monument evidence, occupational evidence, testimonial evidence or any other material evidence you considered, and whether the monument was found or placed.

In 1858, James McBride, Deputy Surveyor, set a wood post with the following B.T.'s: Cedar - 8" - S55°W, 38 links (25.08 feet); Spruce - 12" - N85°E, 22 links (14.52 feet).

In 1981, Milo Stefan, RLS 1558, found two fallen and very rotten posts with a picket alongside. He also found the decayed remains of the spruce bearing tree at record bearing and distance from the post and picket. A scribed 8" cedar bears N31°W, 15.2 feet and blazed lines run north and east. He replaced the post with a 2" x 60" aluminum monument with a stamped tablet.

In 1993, John Garske, RLS, found Stefan's aluminum monument in good condition.

 - 4- Cedar 8" S10°W 16.07 feet
 - 5- Steel sign post 6' NE'ly 1.75 feet




